Hi-tech haven

Brisbane's NEXT Hotel has an app for everything but it didn't always work as expected, writes Ky Chow.

> Rather than expensive extras few of us use, the 4½ star NEXT Hotel uses open-plan design and a mobile app to be the most practical, thoughtful hotel I can recall. Though the technology does come with a few bugs, the first NEXT hotel in the world is easy to recommend for a purpose who can use easy to recommend for anyone who can use a smartphone.

Location

Bang in the middle of Queen Street Mall in Brisbane's CBD, NEXT is surrounded by shopping and easy access to the CBD for office meetings. At night the Mall becomes more of a bar and nightclub zone, but it's a safe and easy walk to the swankier South Bank and the Eagle Street Pier restaurant

Theroom

Thanks to an open plan design, rooms are bright and spacious. The bathroom has sliding doors instead of permanent walls, which means like the trendy open kitchens that are de rigueur in homes, guests can watch TV or admire the views while at the counter preparing for the day. NEXT's mobile app can control almost every aspect





of your stay and while a little buggy, connectivity is the future of both homes and hotels. You can control lights, TV and temperature and I especially loved the ability to message hotel staff even when out and about in Brisbane. Of course, you can still call and speak to NEXT's young and friendly staff too, which is handy since the

Samsung-designed app interface could be more intuitive.

Like most technology-driven aspects of our lives, there are glitches and still some teething issues for the nine-month-old hotel. A selection of free movies is a great idea but they often wouldn't stream over the network and picture quality was average. Sometimes and picture quainty was aver age. Sometimes the TV stopped responding to the app altogether. Opening your hotel door with the app sounds promising, but was a hassle to set up and simply didn't work. Four free mini bar items a day, including nibblies, is a sensible and welcome move, as is the free WiFI.

The bathroom

Besides being sunny and open, the bathroom features a huge shower stall (no bath) but unfortunately water pressure was



weak and uneven, sometimes stopping altogether for a brief but cold second.

Room service is 24/7 and you can get hot food even overnight, such as \$22 beef burgers and \$12 fries.

Outsideyour room, NEXT's standout is the lounge, namely a feature business workers have yearned for in offices – sleep pods. Four futuristic little cocoons in curtained alcoves are perfect for a pre-flight kip. The rest of the lounge is roomy, opening out onto the 20 metre pool (not heated) and connected to a well-equipmed vm. NEXT'S in house well-equipped gym. NEXT's in house Lennons restaurant and bar specialises in rather decadent comfort food.
